#### CONCEPTION CAPTAIN SENTENCED

The federal trial court passed sentence on Conception captain Jerry Boylan last week, giving him four years in federal prison with three years of supervised release following that. Boylan could have gotten as much as ten years, but the judge felt that the overall circumstances did not warrant that. U.S. District Judge George Wu said that while Boylan's behavior was reckless, sentencing guidelines didn't warrant the full ten vears. "This is not a situation where the defendant intended to do something bad," Wu said.

The short version of this is that no one is going to be happy.

The families of the 34 victims are furious in that they wanted the full 10-year prison sentence to be imposed. Others in the diving community feel that while lack of a roving watch, required in the CFRs, is clearly a violation, it is also not slam-dunk proof that that's what allowed the fire to spread. There are many unknowns, including where the fire started, how quickly it spread, and that a roving watch could have been down in the engine room when the fire broke out and emerged to see the vessel already engulfed, and the result could have been the same.

Many are also pointing fingers at the Coast Guard for lack of oversight. Pointing to the fact that the *Conception* was not only inspected every year since it was built, but that it was built to the standards at the time and that as standards changed and evolved – the size of the escape hatch is a good example

- older boats were grandfathered in and not required to do upgrades. But as the post-fire investigation proceeded, not adhering to the standards from which they had been excused was cited as being part of the reason none of the passengers survived. Should that fall into the lap of the Coast Guard? Or should the boats have said, "You need to make us do more than what the standards require."

There are also questions about the origin of the blaze and the speed at which it spread. Although the ATF conducted a test where they concluded that the fire started in a plastic trash receptacle just outside the salon, some have called into question their methodology as it allegedly took them multiple tries to get the fire to start and they never did a similar test with a galley fire due to exploding batteries to compare the two.

If there is anything good that's come out of this horrible tragedy, it's that – starting the day after the fire – there's a heightened awareness of fire safety throughout the diving fleet worldwide as well as a heightened awareness of looking at where escape hatches lead and realizing that when you have a stairway that leads into an area and an escape hatch the leads into the same area, the escape hatch is not really providing an alternate route.

This isn't over yet as Boylan is appealing. So expect this to drag out for a while. Whether or not a new trial is granted remains to be seen but for now, this is where everything stands.

Plus, we'll be staying at Manta Ray Bay Resort, probably the nicest divededicated resort that we frequent around the world. One of the unique features of the place is a huge sailing ship called the *Mnuw*, which serves as the restaurant. We'll have breakfast each morn-

ing on the lower level – they make some of the best bacon I've ever tasted – then go out and dive all day, and cap off the evening with dinner on the top deck of the ship, while dive videos or other entertainment plays out on the big screen – 8x16 feet – that hangs towards the front of the boat.

Yap's got an awful lot to offer as well as being off the beaten path – the dive sites aren't crowded – and we'd love to have you join us.
